o SOLAR ECLIPSE TOUR

A solar eclipse tour has been planned for June 4 through June 20, 1983. A Houston-based expedition will be launched to observe next year's total eclipse of the sun on the Island of Java in Indonesia. Paul D. Maley, a member of the Houston section of the AIAA, Shuttle payload engineer, and a veteran organizer of 5 previous eclipse campaigns, announced that the 16-day trip is open to any and all interested persons who would like to observe/photograph this spectacular event and at the same time visit Taiwan, Singapore, Malaysia, Indonesia, Bali, Thailand and Hong Kong. An optional trip to the Peoples Republic of China is also available.

A limited number of seats is available with a preliminary cost estimate of \$2,980 per person (double occupancy) from the West Coast.

The sun will be totally blacked out by the moon's disc for over 5 minutes, making it a very long eclipse by astronomical standards permitting study of the inner and outer corona, near-sun comet searches, photography of prominences and other related endeavors.

Ground arrangements are being handled by Hanssen Tours of Houston and Clear Lake. Deposits of \$100 per person are being taken beginning February 1982. The last two such tours to Canada (1979) and Africa (1980) filled up rapidly so that early reservation is recommended. For further details contact Paul Maley at 483-5867 (day) or 488-6871 (night).

O SECTION HEARS NASA COUNSEL HOSENBALL

The Houston section of AIAA was addressed by the NASA General Counsel S. Hosenball at the January 1982 dinner meeting, subject: Space Law. Following a short history of the development of the subject, Attorney Hosenball indicated that the earliest work on Space Law was that by Vladimir Mandl in 1932, "The Law of Outer Space, A Problem in Space Travel." However, it was not until the early fifties that lawyers began writing extensively about the legal problems which could be anticipated incident to space activity.

Illustrative of events which have given rise to the establishment of some foundation, and direction, to be anticipated in the development of space law has been not only the fall of Cosmos 954 into Canada, but the reentry of Skylab. Both of these events were well publicized and served to generate a great deal of public interest in space law, both domestic and international. The Outer Space Treaty of 1967 particularly Article VII, which is implemented by the Liability Convention, was invoked by Canada following the reentry of Cosmos 954. The Soviets

first refused to pay on the claim, on the basis that (1) they offered assistance that was refused, and (2) the Liability Convention did not include damages arising out of the cost for search for artifacts, etc. However, they settled for about half of the amount claimed. Claims filed concerning the reentry of Skylab were denied, being scarcely consequential.

Actually, Hosenball stated, there is no competent court for handling Space problems. A suggestion concerning the World Court was answered by the fact that the Soviets have in the past refused to submit to that institution.

Legal problems have been separated into two groups: Those susceptible of priority treatment, and those that were not. The priority group include:

- a. The question of freedom of outer space for exploration and use.
- b. Liability for injury or damage caused by Space Vehicles.
- c. Allocation of radio frequencies.
- d. Avoidance of interference among space vehicles and aircraft.
- e. Identification and registration of space vehicles and identification of launchings.

Legal problems identified in the non-priority group were:

- a. The question of determining where outer space begins.
- b. Protection of public health and safety; safeguards against contamination of or from outer space.
 - c. Questions relating to exploration of Celestial Bodies.
 - d. Avoidance of interference among space vehicles.

The subject of space law excites considerable interest; it is a new field, one in which there is little precedence to direct consideration of questions as they arise. Consequently, there seems to be a great deal of general information available for assimilation and hours can be devoted to the material.

THE TWELFTH ANNUAL ANCIENT INTERFACE SYMPOSIUM

The Ancient Interface is the oldest on-going technical symposium on sailing in the United States. It brings together yachtsmen, engineers, and scientists for a full day's presentation of papers on the science and technology of sailing.


