We are exploring new ideas on serving the membership. A special issue of *Horizons* is being prepared for distribution next month. This will detail the goals and objectives of each section committee and their implementation plans.

A section is only as vibrant as its members. An active membership participates fully in section activities. We are planning quality programs and meaningful services for the membership, and the membership is invited to participate and contribute to its success. If you have ideas for achieving improved efficiency, please contact any member of the board; we are open to suggestions. You can also air your views in the columns of this newsletter.

The Members Speak Out

(The June *Horizons* included two letters concerning the 1991 Section elections and a response by Dr. Zafar Taqvi, then Chairman-Elect and chairman of the Nominating Committee. Interest in the topic continues; the following letters were received last June.)

I have not been very active in AIAA for several years—primarily because of distance coupled with a shift in my emphasis to marine and maritime affairs. However, as one of the starters of the Houston Section, and as one who did his share in its early years, I do have a strong interest in its continued vitality and success.

In view of my interest, I feel compelled to express a very firm belief, based on long experience with many societies and organizations, that the general membership *must* be given a feeling that *they* have a voice in the society's operation and policy. The one-candidate-per-office nomination list is one of the surest ways to *dis*courage the general membership.

Regardless of which side is correct in the reporting of the current dispute, the fact that such a dispute was allowed to occur is not a good sign.

I strongly urge the AIAA Houston Section to *require* multiple nominations for every elected-officer position in the Section.

I read the letters in the *Horizons* Speak Out column about nominations and thought I'd make a suggestion. I'm a member of other organizations, and one of them has a nominating process like the AIAA Houston Section's. It goes like this:

We form a nominating committee, chaired by the most recent past president. Members of the committee are nominated from the floor at a normal business meeting. There are five members on the nominating committee, and two substitutes. Our constitution calls for a nominating committee meeting to have five participants, not including the chair.

The nominating committee meets and forms a slate of officers, nominating only one person for each executive position. The slate is then published in the organization's newsletter for two months prior to the elections. The slate is also read at each monthly meeting before elections (at least two). At the time of elections, the slate is usually elected by acclamation, with no secret balloting.

What we do in this organization vs. what AIAA didn't do in this nominating cycle is allow for nominations from outside the committee. A person wishing to run for a position may nominate him or herself, or nominate another individual, by writing an official nomination letter to the chair of the nominating committee. There is a minimum time prior to elections that such a letter can be received. No nominations from the floor are accepted on election day. The voting membership may then select the officer from the nominated persons.

AIAA could easily add this option into its nomination process. I agree that we should have as much choice as possible in selecting our officers for the coming year. It's clear that if a person wishes to run for a position, s/he should be able to, without seeking nomination through the committee.

Feet of Clay

I dozed off the other night watching TV and awoke to an old Star Trek rerun. After a few minutes, I noticed that Spock, just like the rest of the crew, was saying kilometer, not kilometer. Dictionaries

typically allow either pronunciation, but I'd have expected that Spock, the quintessential logician, would insist on the latter form.
