He is known for his work writing and illustrating more than 60 books under the pen name Dr. Seuss. His work includes many of the most popular children's books of all time, selling over 600 million copies and being translated into more than 20 languages by the time of his death. [...]

"Political views: [...] In his children's books:

"Geisel made a point of not beginning to write his stories with a moral in mind, stating that "kids can see a moral coming a mile off." He was not against writing about issues, however; he said that "there's an inherent moral in any story", and he remarked that he was "subversive as hell.

"Geisel's books express his views on a remarkable variety of social and political issues: The Lorax (1971), about environmentalism and anticonsumerism; The Sneetches (1961), about racial equality; The Butter Battle Book (1984), about the arms race; Yertle the Turtle (1958), about Adolf Hitler and anti-authoritarianism; How the Grinch Stole Christmas! (1957), criticizing the economic materialism and consumerism of the Christmas season; and Horton Hears a Who! (1954), about anti-isolationism and internationalism."

Hydrogen: Future of Clean Energy or a False Solution?




The fossil fuel industry is hyping hydrogen of all kinds as a low-carbon replacement for all sorts of uses of fossil fuels—from powering vehicles and heavy industry to heating buildings. In reality, many hydrogen projects will only lock us in to continued fossil fuel use and additional investments in fossil fuel infrastructure.

The Sierra Club only supports the use of green hydrogen — hydrogen made through electrolysis that is powered by renewable energy. Even in the case of green hydrogen, other conditions must be met for its use to be a good idea:

- Green hydrogen is a promising solution only for uses that cannot otherwise directly rely on clean electricity, which is much more efficient.
- Green hydrogen should not be used to justify a buildout of facilities that otherwise increase pollution or fossil fuel use.
- If green hydrogen is being used, the goal should be to switch to 100 percent green hydrogen once the technology is available. We should not support projects that label themselves as "sustainable" because their fuel source includes a small fraction of hydrogen when the lion's share of it is fracked gas.

They mission was official and open diplomacy for the USA, opposing the German influence, which was Nazi influence. I note that Saludos Amigos and The Three Caballeros now feature this Disney advisory. That is important today, but it is good to learn

7. Melody Time (1948) [The biggest stars are in the last segment - Roy Rogers and the Sons of the Pioneers. They tell the story of Pecos Bill and Slue Foot Sue, and why coyotes howl

9. Donald Duck in Grand CanyonScope (1954) [6 minutes and 50 seconds]

10. Lady and the Tramp (1955) [We know about the two Siamese cats. Stereotypes were used, but it was also a good plot device and dipslayed other talents. As Disney now says in the advisory, it was wrong then and it is wrong now, but Disney decided to show it now. Disney is keeping the conversation going. I conclude I must do my part. I can imagine Americans and others declining to keep the conversation going; me, too. We can imagine Italian stereotypes, too, but as we meet them, as see a sign outside by their door, "Opera House, Uncle Tom's Cabin." The Disney team was displaying courage in 1955 by putting that Easter egg there. Loud anti-racism is shown in a discreet fashion.]
