



For French visual artist JR, the world is his canvas. Taking on the moniker of a photograffeur (French for a photographer/graffiti artist), JR's large-scale mural portraiture has adorned streets from Paris to Rio, and was memorably captured in his 2017 Academy Award®-nominated collaboration with French New Wave icon Agnes Varda, Faces Places.

With his follow up *Paper and Glue*, JR turns the camera on his own work, as he undertakes massive installation efforts on the US-Mexico border, inside the favelas of Rio de Janeiro, on the courtyard of a supermax prison, and more. In each location, JR captures images of residents of these unique communities and memorializes them in striking, massive, black-and-white photo installations, in the process turning some of the most provocative spaces of the world into eye-catching immersive art that challenges perspectives and unites communities. — Cara Cusumano

Houston weather

Is there any freezing weather in sight?

Not yet! The coldest temps over the next 10 days will be lower 40s in about a week.. The latest it has dipped into the 30s at Bush Airport is December 13, 1998. On average, Houston gets its first morning in the 30s in mid-November and its first freeze during the first week of December. Long range projections indicate frigid air currently over Alaska could push toward Texas the week of Christmas, but it's still too soon to know if it will reach us. Ahead of any potential cool down the week of Christmas it will be unusually warm most of next week with highs in the low 80s.

History of Webster, Texas

The Karankawa Indians

The homeland of the Karankawas extended from the west side of Galveston Bay south westward as far as the vicinity of Corpus Christi Bay. They were poorly-equipped, primitive hunters and gatherers. The significance of the name Karankawa is unknown, although it has been said to mean "dog-lovers."

In creeks and estuaries, they found alligators, whose grease, they were reputed to smear on themselves to discourage mosquitoes. A variety of animals and plants contributed to Karankawa subsistence. Deer were hunted, as were bison when they appeared near the coast. Bear, peccary, and small mammals were also taken when the opportunity arose. Berries, nuts, seeds, and other plant foods were gathered on the mainland shore.¹

With the settlement made by Stephen Austin on the Brazos in 1823 began the decline of the tribe. Conflicts between the settlers and the Indians were frequent.
