Event Description

To prepare for the Mars Rover Celebration, primary (grades 3-5) and middle school (grades 6-8) students interested in science and engineering participate in the design and construction of a model rover to carry out a specific science mission on Mars. The model is a mock-up constructed at a minimal cost, comprised of found objects and simple art supplies. Student teams build the models as part of a sixweek classroom or homework project conducted during the fall of 2012. Teams conduct basic research on Mars to determine the operational objectives and structural features of their rover. For 2013, we expect 800+ children, organized into 240 teams.

- **Judges**: Training provided, must stay for entire shift and be fair. There will be 45-minute training sessions at 8:30 am, 9:15 am, 12:30 pm and 1:15 pm. Judges needed: 700
- **Tour Guides**: Familiarity with UH campus and curriculum needed, preference given to NSM, Engineering or Technology students or recent alumni. Tour guides needed: 80
- Logistics/Operations: Work registration and check-in of volunteers, judges and teacher/student teams. Operations volunteers needed: 40
